It is becoming increasingly clear that these losses are rooted in policies that fail to meet students where they are, compounded by a citizenry that is often disengaged from the political process and casting ill-informed votes for people who benefit from an uneducated working class. In this political climate, access to higher education to help people develop their critical thinking skills and understand the importance of civic engagement and voting has never been more important. Education is a public good critical to the health of our democracy.

As faculty, we have the power to shape the future of our institutions and the lives of our students. We must question the effectiveness of current policies and advocate for changes that better align with our mission to provide an accessible and comprehensive education to all. We must engage in constructive dialogue, explore innovative approaches, and unite our voices to demand public investment in the varied goals of our students, removing the barriers they face in accessing higher education.

Throughout this conference, I encourage you to consider how we can transform our community colleges into centers of lifelong learning, support, and civic engagement. Let us work together to reclaim the community in community colleges, fostering an environment that not only provides academic instruction but also cultivates an informed and engaged citizenry.

I challenge each of you to take the insights and strategies gained from this conference back to your own institutions and communities. Share what you've learned with your colleagues, students, and local leaders. Build coalitions of advocates dedicated to creating a more equitable and just education system that truly serves the needs of our diverse student populations.

Together, we have the power to shape policy, transform mindsets, and write a new chapter for California's community colleges grounded in humanity, care, and true equity. United by our commitment to our students and our belief in the transformative power of education, we are ready to counter exclusion with action. Let us leave this conference inspired, energized, and ready to create lasting change. Together, we can build a brighter, more equitable future for all.
